

Teen follows in family footsteps

Third generation is pressed into printing

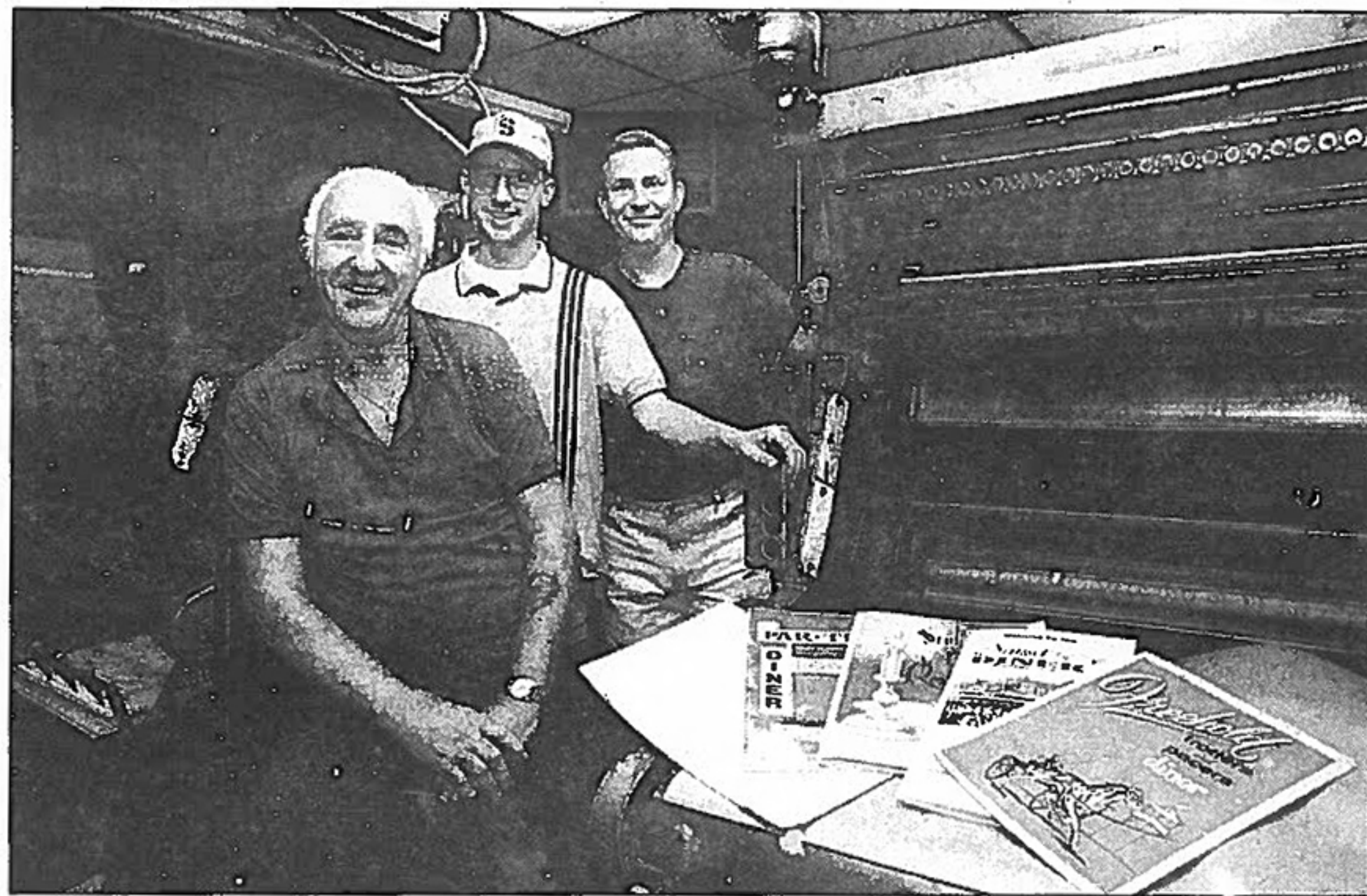
“This is what I have wanted to do ever since I was little,” said Christopher Voza, 18, who this month became the third generation of his family to provide a specialized service: Menus for restaurants.

Christopher, his grandfather Fred and his father, Fred Jr., are the principals in the Jamesburg Press/Madison Printing Service at 9 E. Railroad Ave. in Jamesburg.

Fred Voza started the business about 1956 and his son joined the print shop about 1971.

Because very few other printers specialize in menus, including leather and laminated menu covers, as well as inserts, the Jamesburg Press gathers its specialized business as far south as the Atlantic City area and as far north as the New York Thruway, says Fred Voza Jr.

“We are still a full-service printing business, but my father specialized in

menus since the start,” he said. The firm does business annually with “hundreds of restaurants.”

“We do our own typesetting and laminating — soup to nuts,” said

Christopher’s father.

Fred Jr. and now Christopher commute from their home in Lakewood. Fred Sr., who lives in Old Bridge, is frequently on the road, soliciting busi-

ness and meeting with restaurateurs.

Christopher, who has an elder brother in college, started with the family business two weeks ago. “I feel great; I ran a press.”
